OLD BOY AWARDED THE ORDER OF AUSTRALIA MEDAL GUY WINSHIP (CLASS OF 1978)

Guy Winship (Class of 1978), who very sadly passed away in September of 2018 was posthumously awarded the Order of Australia medal in the annual Australian Honours List on the 26th of January 2020.

The award was mainly to acknowledge his work in founding Good Return in 2003; a large not-for-profit organisation dedicated to improving the lives of those living in poverty in the Asia-Pacific region through financial inclusion, microfinance loans, and training and education.

Shortly after losing an eye to ocular melanoma, the indomitable Guy Winship would announce to friends and colleagues, "In the land of the blind, the one-eyed man is king!", quoting Erasmus with a twinkle in his eye.

On October the 24th of 2018, The Age Publication wrote: "Australia's overseas aid and development community recently lost one of its great humanitarian leaders. In 2003, Guy Winship founded World Education Australia, later known as Good Return, to fight poverty in the Asia-Pacific region. Fifteen years later, Good Return's work has touched the lives of more than 600,000 people who have received loans

and undertaken skills-training to build a better life for themselves and their families".

After completing studies in economics and town planning, Guy worked for a social enterprise that provided vocational skills training and employment to returning political exiles after freedom was established in 1994. He later became the country manager for FINCA Uganda, a pioneering non-profit microfinance institution in Africa, growing its village banking program to provide economic opportunity to more than 30,000 Ugandans.

In 2001, Guy and his family relocated to Sydney, where he established World Education Australia as a not-for-profit organisation dedicated to improving the lives of those living in poverty in the Asia-Pacific region through financial inclusion and education.

In 2018, Good Return funded its 10,000th microloan to Roxan Lacandula from the Philippines who borrowed \$150 to start a small pig-raising enterprise to generate income for her family while her husband was working away from home. In addition to his work for Good Return, Guy served as a voluntary non-executive director on the boards of The

Salvation Army International Development and Habitat for Humanity Australia.

In 2014, Guy was diagnosed with ocular melanoma and had one eye removed. Within a year, the cancer had metastasized, and his illness was diagnosed as terminal. Guy worked tirelessly as CEO of Good Return during this period. He ultimately stepped down in 2016 but continued to work and volunteer as a board member.

Throughout this journey, Guy has upheld and reaffirmed the best of what it means to be Australian: the spirit of egalitarianism and a "fair go" for all, embracing mutual respect, compassion for those in need and the pursuit of public good. Through it all Guy maintained an indomitable spirit and a wicked sense of humour.

HASHIM AMLA RETIRES FROM ALL FORMATS OF CRICKET

Hasim Amla (2000) will go down as one of the greatest to have played the game.

He scored 9282 runs in Test Cricket with an average of 46,6. This included 28 hundreds with a highest score of 311* against England at The Oval in 2012. This is the highest individual Test score of any South African batsman.

He scored 8113 runs in ODI's averaging 49,46 with 27 hundreds.

Amla holds the record for being the fastest ever to score 2000, 3000, 4000, 5000, 6000 and 7000 ODI runs. He also became the fastest cricketer to reach 10 ODI centuries.

SATURDAY 27TH OF MAY 2023:


Bill Payn Fun 10km run from Crusaders Club in Durban North to DHS.

THE CLASS CHALLENGE

After reading an appeal from me last years for support of DHS, the Class of 1982 got together and raised R50 000.00.

A look back in time:

FROM THE MEMOIRS OF ALBERT BAUMANN

At the age of twelve I left the Boys Model School to go to the Durban High School on the Berea. Incidentally, the original position of this High School was behind the Boys Model School facing the Bay, where the present Law Court House now stands. It was moved from there in about 1896 to the Berea, where the school still stands today.

At one period there were four of the family attending the High School. There was Fred who was known as "Baumann Maximus"; Will who was known as "Baumann Major"; I was "Baumann Minor" and Len was known as "Baumann Minimus".

Not much attention was paid to the sports at that time in that there was no real preparation for training etc., and we took part in our ordinary school clothes. Races were run on a gravel court, and I was very surprised and pleased to see Baumann Major coming first in the 100 yards race.

Incidentally, amongst these senior lads who were on the trams was a lad named Carlisle, who later became a Senior Judge in Natal, now retired; also, a lad named Charlie Clarkson, who became a Lawyer and eventually a Cabinet Minister, now deceased. There were also two brothers, Dick and Ray Burne, who became Lawyers in Durban.

As a matter of further interest, in one of these senior

classes, was a lad named Jansen, who was a boarder at the school. He eventually became one of the Governors General in South Africa. There was also a lad named Graham Mackeurtan, who lived in close proximity to the school, and he eventually became one of the leading Barristers of South Africa. Hoby, the Music Master, eventually became Bandmaster of the Grenadier Guards.

The building (pictured below) was adjacent to John Orrs in West Street. The ground floor was a tearoom and the year 1915.

In my final year at DHS in 1978, a number of the 1st team rugby players would help out the Old Boys under 20's on a Saturday when they were short of players. For us it was a real highlight playing with our heroes that were a few years ahead of us at school. Mixing with them and having a few beers afterwards was memorable, as long as Spike never found out. The following year, 1979, a few of us that never went to the army, went and played at Old Boys. Here, at this time Doug had already made his mark in the Old Boys rugby hierarchy, together with a bunch of Australian Internationals. Dick Cocks, Mark Loane, Gary Pearce, Greg Shambrook etc. Doug fitted in perfectly with this bunch of international players, as he was playing brilliant rugby.

Doug was a very versatile player and I remember him playing in all the positions in the backline. I think that he was at his best at fullback, often attacking from the back and using his incredible sidestep to fool the opposition and leave them heading off in the wrong direction. He would set up many opportunities from these counter attacks. But, he was called up to the Natal team as a wing, where he was equally as effective. Doug was also a really talented kicker and was the regular kicker for the 1st team. I was very fortunate to play many games with Doug at Old Boys. I was made to feel very comfortable playing with these legends from a 17 tear old, fresh out of school. Doug was my mentor without him knowing

Doug was a very popular character who always had a smile on his face and made the numerous rugby gypsies at Old Boys feel very welcome. He had a wonderful sense of humour and was always in the middle of a party creating fun.

Doug met Ruth and automatically fell in love and within a few months they were married. They had 4 amazing children. Shannon, Graham, Amy and Sarah.
